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RMIT UNIVERSITY

ESTHER CHARLESWORTH is a Professor in the School of Architecture and Design at RMIT University and Director of the Humanitarian Architecture Research Lab [HARB]. She is the founding Director of Architects without Frontiers (AWF). Since 2002, AWF has undertaken over 42 health, education and social infrastructure projects in 12 countries for vulnerable communities, and has been described by ABC radio broadcaster Phillip Adams as 'destined to develop into one of the greater forces of good on this battered planet'. At RMIT, Charlesworth is the Academic Director of Master of Disaster, Design and Development degree [MoDDD].

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JOHN FIEN is Professor of Practice in the interdisciplinary field of Disaster, Design and Development. He has been involved in the MoDDD degree program since its beginning, and has helped prepare and teach core courses such as Disaster, Design and Development, Building Urban Resilience and Shelter and Settlement, as well as electives such as Humanitarian Architecture and Climate Change, Design and Disaster. His role now focuses on developing national and global partnerships and fostering an applied research culture in HARB. John has been a Professor at Griffith and Swinburne Universities as well as working with agencies such as The World Bank, UNESCO, UNICEF UNEP, AusAID, OECD and WWF-International.

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UIC BARCELONA

CARMEN MENDOZA, Architect, PhD in Urban Design and Planning and Assistant Director of the School of Architecture at UIC Barcelona. She combines teaching and research on the development of integrated approaches in urban regeneration projects. Specifically, she delves on a comprehensive methodology, with special attention to the physical and social characteristics of settlements in order to mitigate the social and spatial schism in our understanding of space, place and social order. She explores on design processes which incorporate an interscalar approach and the needs of local communities. Related to this line, she has developed plans, projects and research in the Metropolitan Region of Barcelona, and informal settlements in Latin America. Her second line of research encompasses reconstruction and urban strategies in the field of emergency architecture and post-conflict situations. In this line she is supervising re-

search and focusing on methodologies for the physical and social integration of refugees.

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RAQUEL COLACIOS, Architect and Master in International Cooperation: Sustainable Emergency Architecture, UIC Barcelona. She is professor and co-director of the Area of Cooperation of the UIC Barcelona School of Architecture. Her research is focused on the recognition and reinterpretation of the social infrastructure layer through a process of living and mapping social networks as part of the urban design process. She is co-founder of the firm TAAB6 Architects in Barcelona, whose activity extends to countries like France, Belgium, Vietnam, and India among others.

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KU LEUVEN

KELLY SHANNON is the current Programme Director of MaHS-MaUSP and an associate professor of Urbanism at the Department of Architecture, KU Leuven. Her design research is at the intersection of interpretative mapping, projective cartography, urbanism and landscape. Her teaching, research and practice engages numerous contexts primarily in the public sector, focused on the development of robust landscape structures as a form of resilience to deal with contemporary design challenges at the territorial and urban design scales. Kelly is co-editor of the book series UFO: Explorations of Urbanism (Park Books, Zurich) and has been editor of the Journal of Landscape Architecture (JoLA).

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BRUNO DE MEULDER studied civil engineering-architecture at the Department of Architecture, KU Leuven (Belgium), where he also obtained his doctoral degree, and where today he teaches urbanism its history, theory and practice. His teaching takes place through urban design studios that he also cherishes in research and practice. He co-edits UFO: Explorations of Urbanism (Zurich, Park Books) and publishes regularly on issues of urbanism in the postindustrial and postcolonial era. He is currently working on an international oeuvre engaging with dispersed urbanism and what Dennis Cosgrove labeled promiscuous territories. He is program co-ordinator of MaHS and MaUSP.

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UNIVERSITY OF WESTMINSTER

TONY LLOYD JONES is an urban planner, designer and Reader in International Planning and Sustainable Development in the Faculty of Architecture and the Built Environment at the University of Westminster in London. He is Director of Research and Consultancy at the University's Max Lock Centre as well as working as an independent consultant under the wider umbrella of Max Lock International Associates. His research focuses on institutional and development impacts of rapid urbanization in developing world cities and regions, addressing economic, social, environmental and climate change challenges. Until recently he was a Commissioner on the RICS Disaster Management Commission. As Urban Policy and Statistics Adviser to DFID from 1997 to 2005 he advised the UK Government on shelter and sustainable urban development issues at the United Nations.

He is currently advising the Federal Government on a post-conflict regional recovery programme in Nigeria and is team leader on a World Bank project on an Urban Land Supply and Affordable Housing Study in Ethiopia.

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AALTO UNIVERSITY

SAIJA HOLLMEN is Aalto ARTS Vice Dean for Art and Creative Practices. Her research interests concentrate around architecture as a socio-cultural construction, as well as interdisciplinary university pedagogy. She is a founding member of Ukumbi NGO together with Jenni Reuter and Helena Sandman and a partner in Hollmén Reuter Sandman Architects Ltd. Their work aims at empowering disadvantaged communities. Saija is a lecturer at the Aalto Department of Architecture, and Vice Dean of Aalto ARTS for Art and Creative Practices.

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MATLEENA MUHONEN is a Lecturer in Landscape Architecture at the School of Arts, Design and Architecture in Aalto University. She also coordinates the interdisciplinary Sustainable Global Technologies (SGT) Programme in the School of Engineering. Matleena has more than ten years of experience in planning and organizing training and education in the field of sustainable development in developing and transition countries. She has organized and facilitated several master's level interdisciplinary student field trips in Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda, Mexico, Nepal and Cambodia. She has been in charge of

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the continuing education training courses on Sustainable Communities in South East Asia and East Africa in collaboration with UN-HABITAT, UNEP and Ministry for Foreign Affairs of Finland.

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THE HUMANITARIAN LOGISTICS INSTITUTE (HUMLOG INSTITUTE) HANKEN SCHOOL OF ECONOMICS

KRISTJANA ADALGEIRSDÓTTIR is an architect and a project manager for research projects and cooperations at the Humanitarian Logistic Institute at the Hanken School of Economics in Helsinki. She is a doctoral student at Aalto University, Department of Architecture. Her research focus is on humanitarian construction, sustainable project management in emergencies and cultural sensitivity in reconstruction. She has mentored at the multidisciplinary master level courses at Aalto SGT (Sustainable Global Technology) pilot projects in Greece and Nepal. Kristjana as a Red Cross delegate, member of ICRC Water & Habitat Specialists Roster and Shelter-Box emergency response team member, with deployments in Iraq, Kenya and the Philippines. Kristjana is a board member of Architects without Borders International.

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DIEGO VEGA is Assistant Professor of Supply Chain Management and Social Responsibility, esp. Humanitarian Logistics and Deputy Director of the HUMLOG Institute. Diego completed his doctoral studies in logistics at the CRET-LOG Research Institute, Aix-Marseille University (France). During his PhD, Diego studied humanitarian logistics organisational competences at MSF (Doctors without borders) Logistique in France. He is member of the Humanitarian Logistics Association (HLA) and Associate Researcher at CRET-LOG. Diego's research interests include logistics services in humanitarian operations, competence-based strategic management for humanitarian organizations, sensemaking, and supply chain maturity. Diego's teaching in graduate and undergraduate studies include logistics and SCM, humanitarian logistics, project management principles, process management and methodologies.

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ENSAPB PARIS-BELLEVILLE

CYRILLE HANAPPE is an architect (Ecole Nationale Supérieure d'Architecture Paris Belleville - ENSAPB) and a civil engineer (Ecole Centrale de Nantes). He

holds a PhD in Architecture from Université Paris-Est. He is the pedagogical director of the Post Master Program in Architecture and Major Risk (DSA RM) at the ENSAPB. He is also partner architect at the firm AIR Architecture (Cyrille Hanappe & Olivier Leclercq), president of the Association Actes & Cités that works on dignity in the built environment. He is associate researcher in the laboratory IPRAUS.

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UNIVERSITY COLLEGE LONDON

CAMILLO BOANO is Professor of Urban Design and Critical Theory at The Bartlett Development Planning Unit (DPU). He is DPU Director of research and since 2007 program Leader of Building and Urban Design in Development MSc at the DPU. He is working on a series of interconnected research projects in Latin America, South East Asia and the Middle East on urban infrastructures, habitability and city-wide upgrade. He is author *The Ethics of a Potential Urbanism: Critical Encounters Between Giorgio Agamben and Architecture* (2017), and two edited books *Urban Geopolitics. Rethinking Planning in Contested Cities* (2018) with Jonathan Rokem and *Neoliberalism and Urban Development in Latin America: The Case of Santiago* (2018) with Francisco Vergara-Perucich.

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POLITECNICO DI MILANO

CAMILLO MAGNI studied architecture at the Politecnico of Milan and at ESTA, Madrid. In 2006, he obtained his PhD in architectural design at Politecnico di Milan where he has been acting as Assistant Professor in several architectural design courses since 2001 (Leonardo and Bovisa). In 2006, he was appointed Adjunct Professor of architectural design. In 2004, he participated in the international research project Casapartes to build low cost housing in Latin America. He is the president of "Architectes Sans Frontiers - Italy" and his working experiences took him to Argentina, Paraguay, Guatemala, Ghana, Egypt and Cambodia. At the moment, he is the Western European Coordinator of Union Internationale des Architectes - UIA. In 2007 he co-founded OperaStudio, an Architectural Design firm in Milan.

In his professional career, he has held seminars and lectures in many universities in Europe, Middle East and Latin America and he is the co-author of remarkable publications in his field of expertise. As an architect he has carried out multiple humanitarian and development researches and field projects in Europe, Latin America, MENA and ASEAN countries, always defending human rights through architecture.

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UNHCR

Miguel Urquia, Architect specialized in Urban Planning, works in Geneva as Senior Emergency Shelter Coordinator in UNHCR and Global Shelter Cluster Deputy Coordinator. He has been working in the humanitarian sector for the last 19 years with UNHCR, IFRC, and the Spanish Red Cross. Prior to his work at headquarters he was based at country-level in Indonesia, Algeria, Morocco, Honduras, and Turkey.

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
